PRAIRIE READERS

It is time for the 12th annual Prairie Readers Competition. The date for the competition will be March 17th at the Armour Elementary School. The event is open to grades 2nd through High School. Teams consist of four members and two alternates who rotate during the event. Everyone gets an equal opportunity to participate. If you have a class with only a few students interested, they can represent that class. Each grade has its own competition for first, second or third place. You do not need a team in each grade just whatever grades are interested. Trophies are awarded to the top two places and medals for third in each grade. Participation ribbons for all non placing contestants. The upper grader will not have as many books as the younger grades due to book size and the increased activities these youth have.

The list of books is enclosed with reading to **start** when **your school desires**. We felt that if a teacher chooses to use any of the books as part of their curriculum the list would be available to them.

The class divisions will be as follows 2nd and 3rd; 4th and 5th; 6th and 7th; 8th & High School.

We all know how important reading is in the education of our children. Prairie Readers provides a wonderful opportunity to keep children interested in reading. An additional bonus is an introduction to books, which they may not have read on their own. On the list we have strived to offer a variety of books. Remember that although a certain type of story may not capture the imagination of one student it may become a favorite of another.

This year we have chosen several books that have been used in the past with a scattering of new books. This is in hopes that it will help schools with their budgets. The list of books will have a notation behind the author with the year the book was used previously.

Armour High School the last several years has offered an English class to their students called Strategic Reading. This was an independent (not during the regular school day) study where the students read books and had discussions/assignments with the teacher. The prairie reader's books were a majority of the books read. This will give the youth an opportunity to get credit for being in PR. It is not a required

class in order to go out for PR just a class where you can get credit for reading the PR books. We were excited to see this class being offered again this year. Mrs. Schneider at Armour High School would be a contact if you are interested in how the class was conducted.

We would love to have your school involved in our **Prairie Readers** program. We do ask that you let us know one way or the other by **December 14**th or before. The fee this year is \$75.00 per school. Please make payment payable to <u>Women In Action</u> not to the Armour School.

PRAIRIE READERS TIME LINE

AUGUST 2014 – Reading starts when schools desire **SEPTEMBER 2014** – Armour encourages parent participation by requesting them to read assigned books and write questions to be used in practices.

DEC. 14TH **2014**— Entries & fees due to Prairie Readers committee

FEBRUARY 2015— This is when Armour will start practicing with their teams. These are held immediately following school.

MARCH 1st, 2015- 15 questions/book are due to the Prairie Readers committee for the competition. We will let you know what books we need questions on.

Number of students participating/class requested to help with set up and refreshment planning.

MARCH 17TH, 2015 – Prairie Readers Competition @ Armour. Encourage your parents to attend! Bring your book list suggestion with you to the competition.

- 1. Each school is responsible for providing 15 questions/book (3x5 note cards work well) to be used in the competition. NOTE: we just need 15 questions/book not per grade so for example your 2nd/3rd grade book Ramona Ellen Tibbits by Beverly Cleary just send 15 questions not 30. (We have started putting the page numbers where the question is in the book in case of a discrepancy) These questions will be required a couple weeks prior to the competition so the committee can screen for duplicates. THIS YEAR WE HAVE BOOKS THAT WERE USED IN THE PAST. THEREFORE THOSE BOOKS WILL NOT NEED AS MANY QUESTIONS TURNED IN. NOTE SPECIAL REMARKS ON BOOK LIST SHEET! I will get you a list of the books that will need questions on in the next couple of weeks. These questions will be used for the competition; they will not be distributed out to any other teams prior to the competition. These questions can be used for your practices, just send copies. Remember the questions are structured in the format of "In what book did the character? Do not use specific names. Each school is also responsible for providing 2 people to act as scorekeepers/timers during the competition. Armour provides the readers for each grade. We will make assignments prior to the competition.
- 2. The judges will check with each team to establish who the team spokesperson is. Judges need to determine the team spokesperson after each team substitution. Remind the participants that the answer on the question card is the *only* answer that will be accepted. *Disputes will not be allowed*. Questions will be presented to the teams in the order they appear in the card pile.
- 3. **TIE BREAKER**: At the beginning of the competition each team will be given a list of questions. They have 5 minutes to write book title and author for answers. These sheets will be gathered and "graded" for use in the event of a tie in the top 3 teams in each grade. These are used in the essesence of saving time at the end.
- 4. The competition is comprised of two timed rounds of questions. The judges will begin the competition with the first team that is on the score sheet and proceed according to the order on the sheet. For example, if Andes Central is the first team on the sheet, the judge will read from the question card and say, "Andes Central team: In what book did.....". The team will have 30 seconds to confer with each other to have their spokesperson verbally give the correct title. The answer is to be given by the spokesperson for that team. If the team replies correctly, they will be awarded 10 points and will have a chance at a bonus. For the bonus, they will be given 10 seconds to confer with each other and have their spokesperson verbally name the author of the book. Last name of the author is sufficient. If they answer correctly, they receive 5 points. The other competing teams, substitutes and audience are to remain quiet.
- 5. If a team does not answer the first question correctly, ALL OTHER TEAMS have a 15 second opportunity to steal for 5 points. (Steals are only to be used if a team cannot give the correct title of a book. Steals do not apply when a team gives the correct title, but cannot name the author.) In a steal, the teams write the last name of the AUTHOR of the correct book. (Each team will be provided with a marker and writing pad.) There will be no writing of author's names on the writing pad before the competition. After a 15 second time period, the judge will say "time" and one member of each team will hold up their pad (high). They are to keep their pads up till all points are given. A score of 5 points will be awarded to each team that has the correct name of the author. No points will be awarded for the book title on steals. It must be the author. The team who missed the title of the book is not eligible for a steal or any points given during a steal.
- 6. It is the responsibility of the judges to ensure that each team on every grade level is asked an equal number of questions per round. Not all grade levels will cover the same number of questions. The number of questions completed in each grade level is determined by the speed and accuracy of the answers given by the teams. If a team completes all the questions before the round is over, we ask that the school team and audience stay seated and quiet until the end of the round is announced.

- 7. At the end of each round the tally sheets will be taken to the tabulation room.
- 8. Trophies will be awarded to individual team members for 1st and 2nd place and medals awarded for 3rd place team members. The school with the most accumulated points will receive a trophy to keep and a traveling plaque, which returns to the next year's competition. The team points will be awarded in each grade level as follows: 1st place -11 pts, 2nd place 10 pts. 3rd place 9 pts, 4th place 7 pts., 5th place 6 pts., 6th place 5 pts., 7th place 4 pts., 8th place 3 pt.; 9th place 2 pt.; 10th place 1 pt. In the event of a tie in places below 3rd place the points will be divided evenly between the two teams. If a school has more than one team in a class the highest ranking team will receive the team points.
- 9. In the past schools have called and asked about having 2 teams in a grade. We don't want to discourage anyone so we have welcomed that. We feel that if you have high interest in a class and want to bring more than one team than do so. We only ask that you let us know for our planning. We will use the highest team's points to tabulate the overall team trophy.
